PRESBYTERIAN TIDINGS

This year, the first Sunday of this month (December 1) is the first day of the Christian calendar and the first Sunday in the season of Advent. During this season, Christians customarily prepare their souls for the "coming" of the Son of God. But, my Christian friends, which "coming" are we preparing for?



Because the word "advent" itself means "coming" or "arrival," and because it precedes Christmas, many Christians have misunderstood Advent to be exclusively a time to get ready to celebrate the coming of a child at Bethlehem. But, the season of Advent is much broader in its significance. It is not just about the "coming" of Christ's nativity; Advent is also (and perhaps more so) about the "second coming" of Christ. Advent concerns the future of the Risen One, who will judge wickedness and prevail over every evil. Advent is the celebration of the promise that Christ will bring an "end" to all which is contrary to the ways of God. The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the first step of this end of the powers of death—the inauguration and anticipation of what is yet to come in fullness.

Advent—as the beginning of the liturgical year in the life of the church—takes our thinking to the very end of things. Here, the word "end" does not refer to the "end of time." Rather, it refers to the central "purpose" or "goal" of creation. We are not aimlessly wandering in a wilderness. Rather, history is headed somewhere by God's direction. It is necessary that the liturgical year begin with Advent—with the focus on a central, holy intention. Without this focus, the story of Jesus (which is about to be rehearsed from conception and birth to death and resurrection) may seem less than what it is—the deliberate fulfilling of divine purpose, unfolding through the course of history. Advent's focus on the central purpose of God in history can keep the story of Jesus Christ from falling into irrelevance.



Advent reminds us that the sacred story of God in Christ—to be understood aright—has to be read backward. Just as the birth and ministry of Jesus are meaningless until we know of the Lord's death and resurrection, so too the whole of the past is muddled unless first we have a grasp on the nature of the future. It is Advent's focus on the "end," as well as the "beginning," which makes our worship a joyful anticipation as well as a hopeful reminiscence.

We have been looking at each commandment individually from a dual perspective that asks what behaviors the commandment specifically forbids as well as what behaviors the commandment encourages, because each commandment can be seen in both a positive and negative light. For this month's installment in this series of articles, we will turn our attention to the sixth commandment according to the reformed tradition. That commandment is thou shalt not kill.

Thou shalt not kill might seem like one of the more straightforward and easy to understand commandments of the 10, but it is deceptively complex in its brevity and comes to us with no small amount of controversy. For starters, different translations of the Bible and different faith traditions don't all render this commandment in the same way. There is debate about whether the correct translation is "thou shalt not kill" or "thou shalt not murder". The most significant difference in the two parsings being the intention and attitude of the act. You can kill someone remorsefully while Murder is devoid of remorse. The best and easiest example of this being war. Soldiers kill, but they don't murder. A soldier doesn't murder because they don't WANT to have to kill.

The Hebrew word used in the command is "rasah" and there is linguistic evidence to suggest that the word could mean either kill or murder. If we render rasah as murder it limits the scope of the commandment. If we render the word as kill, it broadens the scope of the commandment and Christendom seems to be pretty evenly divided on which of these versions is intended in the original text. The distinction is an important one too as this commandment has direct implications to a myriad of hot button issues. Our understanding of this commandment can and should influence our stance on capital punishment, war, abortion, euthanasia and all manner of other things. I guess it's appropriate, in a way, that we have a not so black and white understanding of a commandment that touches so many not so black and white issues.

This is where looking at the commandment from a different viewpoint comes in handy. The command forbids us from either killing or murder but what is the positive frame for this commandment? What does it encourage in us rather than prohibit? I'd argue that the sixth commandment encourages us to see life as the miracle that it is and not to treat it lightly. It calls us to see that life is a sacred thing and that ending life is no small matter. In this way, the sixth commandment pairs nicely with the fifth which also affirms that life, even the lives of the very old and very young, has value and is innately something to be cherished and preserved (you can read more on this in my previous month's article, if you're interested). So, yes, do not kill or murder, but also cherish life. Cherish EVERY life. Cherish your own life and the lives of others and when we can do that, we'll truly be living into what the commandment is asking us to do.


