

PRESBYTERIAN TIDINGS

WHY DO I FOLLOW JESUS CHRIST?

When asked, "Why do you follow Jesus Christ?" some might answer that they follow Him because He is the Son of God. And, while this answer might be reason enough to follow Christ, I must admit that it is not my reason for following Him. Indeed, being the Son of God is the reason that I worship Jesus, but it is not my reason for following Him.

No, I follow Jesus Christ because I find his teachings about the kingdom of God to be right and true—teachings in both word and deed. His teachings about the kingdom of God seem to run contrary to the values of humanity and worldly realms. Jesus taught that we are to welcome the stranger, to feed the hungry, to heal the broken, to comfort the dying, to redeem the lost, to serve with humility, to speak for the marginalized, to aid the poor, to give without measuring the cost, to forgive without recompence, to love God, to love one another, to love neighbor as self, to love our enemies, to love sacrificially. Jesus taught these kingdom values not just by saying it, but also by living it.

The world may give lip-service to these teachings of Christ as quaint and sophistic sentimentality. The world may regard such teachings as inspirational ideals, but hardly implementable and certainly not practical in the so-called "real world." The world may even profess to worship Jesus Christ as the Son of God, but it will seldom follow Him as it's leader. Many would rather follow leaders who promote personal prosperity, not aid for the poor; self-righteousness, not repentance and forgiveness; self-reliance, not care for the marginalized; self-preservation, not welcoming the stranger; loving and giving only when it is self-beneficial.

These age-old values, which are so characteristic of the world and its leaders, and which so many people live by, have a certain pragmatic logic. Indeed, these values have an intrinsic appeal to the innate avarice and pride that resides in all of us. And yet, there is something about the teachings of Jesus Christ, even as contrary as they are to my inherent selfish desires, that seem right, true, and correct. When I step aside from my own rational self-interest, I discover another reality at work within me. Perhaps it is an *a priori* ethical awareness, perhaps it is moral intuition, perhaps it is the Holy Spirit—call it what you will. I simply am convicted by the unassailable truth that the teachings and ministry of Christ are incontrovertible.

This is why I am not only a worshipper of Jesus Christ, the Son of God, but I am also a disciple of Jesus Christ, following His teachings and patterning my life after His. For, no matter how much I want to live by values of my own self-interest, the surpassing value of sacrificial love for others and for God has transformed my very being. I may be from the kingdoms of this world, but I must answer the inner call to the kingdom of God.

Teaching with Soul by Joel

As we've just begun a new church year with the season of Advent, I've decided to start a new series of newsletter articles on the spiritual disciplines. I'm doing this in an attempt to make the coming year a time of growth and renewal for our church and championing these practices is the best way I know how to do this. These disciplines have been tested over the centuries by the church and any Christian willing to put them into regular practice is going to see tangible spiritual growth. So over the course of the next year, I will devote this newsletter space to the subjects of solitude, silence, fasting, secrecy, sacrifice, study, worship, service, fellowship, confession, celebration and submission. We will begin in this month's article by looking at solitude.

Have you ever noticed in the gospels how often Christ was trying to get away from the crowd? Jesus tries to seclude himself just before he walks on the water (Matt. 14:23), just before he feeds the five thousand (Mark 6:31) and just before his arrest in the garden of Gethsemane (Matt. 26:36). Why do you suppose Christ was always trying to get away from everyone? Maybe it's because Christ knew that there was a connection between solitude and closeness with God. Christ's actions suggest that there's something to be said for being alone with God. Now I'll admit that there's also something to be said for enjoying God in the company of others. That's why fellowship is also one of the spiritual disciplines, but there is an intimacy that comes when you make it a point to spend time with God and cut everyone else out, that you just don't get otherwise. That's the reason why so many spiritual retreats and monasteries are set in secluded areas. Being alone is spiritually beneficial because it helps you to concentrate and focus your attention where it is needed. In seclusion, you are making God your highest priority by putting a physical distance between yourself and every other person or thing that might be a competing priority.

Unfortunately true seclusion is getting harder and harder to come by these days. Even as we quarantined during the height of the pandemic, I doubt you were truly as secluded as it might have seemed. As a society, we've taken precautions against ever having to be alone. These precautions come in the form of cell phones and laptops and iPads and televisions. We are constantly just a few pushes of a button away from being able to reach just about anyone in the world. We are continuously in contact and rarely unreachable. A whole world of distractions makes this one of the more difficult disciplines to achieve on a regular basis. It seems like even Jesus had a little bit of difficulty with this one because, if you look at those scripture references in the first paragraph, while Jesus was constantly TRYING to get away, he wasn't always successful at it. But the benefits of a few precious moments alone with God certainly make the trying worthwhile and it doesn't have to be some long stretch of time either. Just five minutes of solitude in quiet contemplation can make a difference and is worth the effort. So in the coming year, I'd encourage you to give true solitude a chance, if you can, and see what benefits spring forth from it.
