## MEDITATIONS ON THE APOSTLES' CREED I BELIEVE IN GOD'S ONLY SON

"His only Son"—in the Latin, "Filium Eius unicum." But what is the antecedent of the possessive pronoun "eius" (his)? Whose only Son is Jesus the Christ?

The Apostles' Creed affirms our belief in God "and" in Jesus the Christ who is the only Son of God the Father. At least in human terms, a father is one who begets daughters and sons, so, it intuitively follows that Jesus is the Son of the Father. Admittedly, it seems incomprehensible that God could beget a Son in the way human fathers do. Indeed, the word "begotten" does not occur in the Apostles' Creed. It does, however, occur in the creed's ecumenical cousin, the Nicene Creed; where the Greek verb γεννάω (gennáō, "to beget, to give birth to") appears twice. Of Jesus Christ, the Nicene Creed affirms that he is "begotten of the Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, true God of true God, begotten, not made; of the same Being with the Father."

Here, the Nicene Creed is not making a biological statement, but a theological one. It is not asserting that the Son is a creation who would otherwise be subordinate to the Creator. Rather, the Nicene Creed chooses the biblical word "begotten" ( $\gamma\epsilon\nu\nu\dot{\alpha}\omega$ ) to affirm that the Son as a co-eternal, co-equal being with God the Father.

When the New Testament was formally translated into English in 1611, the translators were predisposed to the theological orthodoxies of the church, including statements of faith proclaiming that Jesus is the Father's begotten. They were so inclined to witness to Jesus' relationship with God the Father that they were prone to find the word <u>γεννάω</u> ("to beget") in places where it was not. Indeed, those who produced the King James Version of the Bible translated the Greek word <u>μονογενής</u> (monogenés) as "only begotten." "For God so loved the world, that he gave his *only begotten* Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life" (John 3:16; KJV).

It is perhaps understandable why the King James Version chose to render μονογενής as "only begotten." The translators assumed that this Greek word was a combination of two roots: μόνος (mónos), meaning "only;" and γεννάω, "to beget." However, μονογενής is actually a compound of μόνος and γένος (génos), meaning "kind." Thus, John 3:16 (and other New Testament verses that use this word) is not specifically saying that Jesus is God's "only begotten," but that more precisely he is God's "one-of-akind" Son.

This New Testament assertion that Jesus is the "one-of-a-kind" Son of God is affirmed in the Apostles' Creed with the Latin adjective *unicus*. Although commonly translated into English as "only," its more specific meaning is "unique" (a word which itself originates from *unicus*). Hence, the creed is clearly identifying Jesus the Christ as God's unique, one-of-a-kind Son.

But, what is it that makes Jesus' sonship so unique? What sets his sonship apart from the rest of us who are children of God? Of course, we saw in chapter three that Jesus' kinship to God is unique in that he is the begotten Son, whereas our kinship is through adoption. But Jesus' uniqueness extends beyond a mere sharing of the same Being with God the Father.

Perhaps the book of Hebrews best summarizes how Christ is that one-of-a kind Son through whom God uniquely interacts with us.

Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word. When he had made purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high, having become as much superior to angels as the name he has inherited is more excellent than theirs. (Hebrews 1:1-4)

Hebrews highlights the one-of-a-kind nature of Christ the Son by describing him as "the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being." Accordingly, Jesus is not a mere replica of divine glory; he is not just a facsimile of God's resplendence. Rather, the very being of God is tangibly heard and seen uniquely in Jesus Christ, the Word made flesh (John 1:14). This incarnate Word reveals the immediate and unadulterated nature of God. Paradoxically, part of that divine nature revealed by Christ just so happens to be God's very own humanity—a humanity which loves neighbors as self—a humanity of compassion for others—a humanity of sacrifice—the humanity of Jesus Christ. For, Christ was not just truly human; he is true humanity; he is the pure embodiment of what God created humanity to be.

Christ is humanity in a way that the rest of us human beings are not—broken and sinful as we are. Even though we had been created originally in the "image of God" (Genesis 1:27), we have willfully and rebelliously recreated ourselves in our own self-righteous image. We have so woefully tainted and tarnished the image of God within us that our humanity reflects God's glory only faintly. The imprint of God's very being upon us is worn so smooth as to be barely visible, if at all. This is why the author of Hebrews makes the assertion that Christ the Son, and none other, is in the unique position to make "purification for sins." Christ alone is the true humanity that we were meant to be, that we ought to be. He is our true humanity in our stead. Among all of God's children, Jesus Christ is unique in that he alone can reveal humanity as part of God's nature and restore humanity as our original nature.

Among all other sons and daughters of God, whether they be mortals or angels, the only one—the only son—who is able to mend creation's brokenness and restore it to a rightful relationship to its Creator is Jesus Christ. This is why the author of Hebrews acknowledges that Christ now holds the unique honor and responsibility of sitting "at the right hand of the Majesty on high." And this is why the Apostles' Creed affirms our faith in the one who inherited a name more excellent than that of any angel. And that name is "God's only Son."

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. (John 3:16)

It was a busy and fulfilling Christmas season for our church! Here are some pictures from everything we did this Christmas from Parent's Day Out to the Christmas parade to our Christmas Pageant to The Marshall Moretz Dinner to our candlelight service. Thanks to everyone who made this Christmas season such a memorable one for our church family!



Somehow Facebook has decided that I enjoy watching videos of people doing home improvements incorrectly. The people making these videos call them hacks, but, if you spend any time thinking about them critically, more often than not, they are really just horrible ways to DIY things. I don't know how this has happened. I'm not a DIY kind of guy. It's likely because I always end up watching these things to the end when they show up on my feed and Facebook interprets that as me liking that kind of video, but I am usually watching with a healthy dose of disbelief and skepticism and straight up morbid curiosity. I don't watch them because I like them, I watch them because they drive me crazy.

So I find myself in a position where I can't scroll through my feed without seeing some misguided person demonstrating how to use a stack of old pizza boxes to repair a hole in drywall, or some other person fixing a dent in their car with several layers of tinfoil and a spot welder. Usually they make it so the finished product looks just fine, but there's no way these fixes are gonna hold up. Pizza box drywall will surely attract ants and smell after a while. Tinfoil car repair won't stand up to the first time it rains. They fix nothing in these videos and, I'd argue, they're actually just making things worse.

In the fourth chapter of Luke, we get the story of Christ's temptation. Christ is wandering in the wilderness when Satan approaches him. Satan tempts Christ with food, power and recognition. Christ doesn't give in to the temptation and Satan leaves, vowing to return.

The interesting part about this scripture to me, is that Satan tempts Christ with good things. Satan offers Christ solutions to very real problems he was facing. Christ was hungry so Satan offered him a way to get food. Christ was worried about the fate of humanity so Satan offered him the power to do something about it immediately. Christ wanted people to hear his message of love, so Satan offered him a way to be noticed. Satan was fixing problems for Christ, but he wasn't fixing them in the right way. He was offering up tinfoil and pizza boxes to problems that needed to be fixed legitimately. He was offering solutions that wouldn't hold up.

Lent begins this month. It's a time for self reflection and repentance. It's a time to be cognizant of what tempts us. It's a time to notice that we likely haven't been fixing things in our lives in the right way. Maybe we've been trying to fix our loneliness with food or trying to fix our sorrow with alcohol or trying to fix our fear with hatred. Or maybe it's one of a myriad of other temptations we've fallen into. Whatever temptation we find ourselves struggling with, the quick fixes available to us won't be any kind of real solution to the problem. It's time to follow Christ's example and start fixing things in the right way by quenching our temptations with the authentic love offered to us through Christ and by passing that love onto others. This is the heart of the Lenten journey. It's a fix that will surely last.

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#### MISSION.....a body of people sent

One of the most obvious goals of the programs and events sponsored by our Missions Committee is to help people to have access to the basic needs of life: food, water, shelter, and clothing. Members of the Missions Committee appear on the pulpit often during church to promote special offerings to raise money to help people to meet these needs. Did you ever wonder how much money we collected for the special offerings we promote almost every month? And after we collect it, what do we do with it? The Missions Committee is committed to doing a better job of providing the members of our congregation with the answers to these questions. Let's start with the matter of the Special Offerings which we promote during 10 months of the year. No special offering is taken up in January or July. Here is the schedule of the 10 special offerings for 2023 and the schedule for 2024 is very similar. Four of these offerings are the ones recommended by the Presbyterian Church USA (noted by an \* below) and six are ones our church has added. Our congregation gave to these offerings as follows:

Feb., June, August, and Nov.: these are the 5 Cents per Meal offerings which totaled \$4033; they count as four of the six added by the church. 20% of this total was given to Grace Now, a food bank here in Richmond and the other 80% was sent to the Presbyterian Hunger Program.

March: Moment for Madison Missions: \$2650 was collected and this money stayed in Madison County. 45% was distributed to Madison Home; 45% to Hope's Wings; 10% to our Love Fund. Last year the Love Fund had a budget of \$84,000 provided by the Telford Foundation and by memorial donations from individuals. Hope's Wings is the Domestic Violence Shelter here in Richmond. Madison Home is now providing a shelter for the homeless during the winter months.

April: One Great Hour of Sharing\*: \$3094.33 all of which goes to our Presbytery to distribute for disaster assistance and the hunger program. They congratulated us on the fact that our church submitted more money than any other in our Presbytery.

May: Pentecost\*: 1380; 40% went to the New Liberty Family Shelter in Richmond; 60% went to PCUSA in support of youth organizations.

Sept.: Buckhorn Children's Home: \$3043; Buckhorn is still rebuilding after the flooding in July 2022. Our church has a long history of support for the Buckhorn ministry.

Oct.: Peace and Global Witness\*: \$1575; 75% went to PCUSA to work on peacemaking and justice initiatives; 25% went to Hope's Wings.

Dec.: Christmas Joy Offering: \$3094 went to PCUSA to support past and present leaders of our denomination and to support young people to further their education at Presbyterian related colleges and schools.

#### GRAND TOTAL OF THESE 10 SPECIAL OFFERINGS WAS: \$18,325.33.
