THE SUNDAYS OF LENT (NOT IN LENT)

Have you ever taken note of the way we Christians reckon time throughout the liturgical year? I dare say that many worshippers probably pay little (if any) attention to how the Sundays of the Christian year are actually named. But if you are one of those fastidious worshippers who follow the seasons and observances of the Christian calendar carefully, you might have noticed an oddity around the season of Lent.

Perhaps you have noticed that Sundays are almost always designated as a numerical Sunday *in* a season or a time. For example, we may reference a Sunday as the Fourth Sunday *in* Advent, or the first Sunday *in* Christmastide, or the third Sunday *in* Eastertide, or the eighteenth Sunday *in* Ordinary Time. However, when we enter the season of Lent, we do not reckon those Sundays as occurring *in* Lent.

Lent is a season of fasting as a sign of our penitence. It is essentially a season of forty days that are meant to symbolize the time that Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness (Mark 1:12-13). It begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday (the last day of Holy Week). However, if you add up the days from Ash Wednesday to Holy Saturday, there are forty-six days. So, how can this be? If Lent is a forty-day season of penitential fasting, where do the other six days come from?

The six extra days between Ash Wednesday and Holy Saturday are those six Sundays that the season of Lent happens to encompass. But, liturgically, those six Sundays are not counted as part of the forty days of Lent. Rather, we designate them as the Sundays of Lent (e.g., the fifth Sunday of Lent). But, why? Why is the season of Lent an exception to the way we usually designate our Sundays?

Each Sunday (also known as the Lord's Day) is observed as the day of Resurrection; i.e., each Sunday is a little Easter. And because each Sunday is the Lord's Day, every Sunday is a feast day—a day of celebration. Thus, we distinguish the Sundays of Lent as a time of feasting and celebration, not a time of fasting. For this reason, our Sundays are of Lent and not in Lent.


Prayer Breakfast

We've been doing a continuing series on the Ten Commandments in this space over the past several months. So far, we've managed to work our way up to the 7th commandment, which is the commandment we will be tackling in this article. In this series, we've attempted to view each of the 10 commandments from a dual perspective by asking "what does this commandment specifically forbid" as well as asking "what does this commandment encourage"? We've done this in an attempt to gain a better understanding of what the commandment is asking of us at its core.

So what is at the core of the 7th commandment, "You shall not commit adultery"? The commandment is straightforward enough, but it's simplicity can be deceiving. It begs the question, what constitutes adultery? Is it just sex outside of marriage or is it more complex than that? The second Westminster confession defines the meaning of this commandment as "being chaste in thought, word and action". That certainly covers a lot more ground than just sex outside of marriage. So, in the church at least, adultery is more than just sex. It is any number of marital infidelities and there is no hard and fast rule about what constitutes marital infidelity within the confines of all the completely unique relationship dynamics that exist in all the marriages in the world.

My favorite example of this is actually an old episode of King of Queens where Doug, the husband of the show, is secretly switching out meals made by his wife for meals made by another woman because the other woman is a better cook. While you'd be hard pressed to make the argument that eating food cooked by someone who is not a spouse is adultery, there is also something that just seems wrong about the situation. It is certainly deceptive, but it is also unfaithful, in a way. It is an odd sort of intimate betrayal. When Doug's wife, Carrie, finds out what Doug has been doing with his lunches, it becomes clear that she feels hurt and betrayed by Doug. Eating lunch made by another woman was not sex but it was a breach of trust. It was an infidelity of sorts. So it is that that the 7th commandment forbids us not just from adulterous sex, but also from any number of unfaithful behaviors be it flirting or looking or wanting or even accepting food from another person, if doing so would hurt your partner who you have committed to love.

That's what's forbidden by this commandment but what's the other perspective? What does the commandment encourage in us rather than prohibit? I'd say that the answer to that question is trust. The fruit of fidelity in marriage is a strengthening of trust between partners. It's having a partner that you can count on. It's having a partner with whom you can be open and vulnerable. The safety provided by adherence to the seventh commandment only serves to cultivate trust both within and without of a marriage. So the seventh commandment, at it's core, forbids infidelity and encourages trust.
