THOUGHTS ON MEMORIAL DAY

On Memorial Day, we remember those who have made the ultimate sacrifice for the very lives we live this day; we remember how they have followed in the footsteps of Christ's own sacrificial grace. May their sacrifice inspire us to hold our servicewomen and men in our prayers. May God enfold them in His sheltering grace and providential care as they stand in the gap for our protection. May the members of our armed forces be supplied with courage to face each day, and may they trust in God's providence to accomplish each task. This is going to be the last article in our series of newsletter entries on the spiritual disciplines. I hope that you've enjoyed reading about some of the different types of disciplines available to us as Christians as much as I've enjoyed writing about them and I hope that you've been able to learn a little something through this process as well. The last discipline we'll be covering is the discipline of submission.

These two components are submission to others and submission to God. Both of these practices can be difficult endeavors to take on and here is why: It's hard giving up control. For the most part, we value control and independence in our lives. It is a scary thing to hand that control over to another person or even to God, but that is exactly what the discipline of submission challenges us to do. We are to relinquish control, and the reason that we are to relinquish control is that the control we think we have is actually an illusion.

Paul discusses this notion in the book of Romans, and he sums up his thoughts on the matter by saying, "But thanks be to God that, though you used to be slaves to sin, you have come to obey from your heart the pattern of teaching that has now claimed your allegiance. You have been set free from sin and have become slaves to righteousness" (Rom. 6:17-18). Paul does not present us with an option where we are not slaves. There is no scenario in this life where we are in charge of what happens to us. We are always slaves to something. We are always submissive to something. In Paul's thinking, submission is inescapable. We are either submissive to God or we are submissive to sin and when we try to retain control of our own lives it is the latter master that we have chosen because we have decided that we know what is better for our lives than God, Himself.

While this explains why we should submit ourselves to God, why is it important that we also submit to others? After all, God is worthy of our trust while other people are not. Submitting to other people makes us seem weak and vulnerable. Also, people, in general, tend to be just the worst. Wouldn't this kind of submission open us up to being used and taken advantage of? I think that the answers to these questions are yes. Submission does make us vulnerable and submission can lead us to be used and taken advantage of, but that simply means that we need to be careful when practicing submission and not that we should avoid submission altogether. Sometimes it is spiritually important for us to submit to others, though it goes against our very nature to do so.

To illustrate this, I would be willing to wager that behind every church schism there are two factions of people unwilling to practice this discipline. By this way of thinking, the discipline of submission can be defined as the art of valuing the peace and unity of God's church over your own personal point of view. In other words, sometimes there is spiritual health in conceding the point in an argument and not being stubborn about things. Deciding when it is time to do this can be more of an art than a science though. Submission is knowing which hills are worth dying on and which are not and that takes practice..

So how about it, are you in control of your life? Have you chosen your master? Are your plans and opinions set or have you left a little room for flexibility? My prayer for you, in this month, is that you might know the peace that comes with turning your life over to God's control and submitting yourself to others.


