

PRESBYTERIAN TIDINGS

SPEAK WE MUST!

My Christian Friends: in today's heated and invective social climate, it is ever so difficult to speak the truth about the kingdom of God and about the mission and message of Jesus Christ without sounding politically partisan. And yet, speak we must! In this intense social climate, what may sound like partisan attacks is really just truth; what may sound like a political agenda is merely the gospel of God, it is the good news of Jesus Christ. Speak we must! ["Teacher, order your disciples to stop." Jesus answered, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out." (Luke 19:39-40).]

When we Christians offer grace to the migrants, we are scolded for inviting terrorists into our homes. But it is a shameful falsehood to assume all migrants are terrorists. They are not! We simply embody the words of our Savior, "I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (Matthew 25:35).

When we advocate for medicine for the impoverished sick, we are scolded for promoting a system that encourages government free-loaders. But it is a false equivocation to equate the poor with grifters. They are not! The truth is: the poor and the sick often have nothing else but God, which is why the kingdom of God favors them. We Christians simply embody the words of our Savior, "Blessed are you who are poor, for yours is the kingdom of God" (Luke 6:20).

When we advocate for feeding the hungry, we are scolded for promoting a welfare system that rewards laziness. But it is a dishonest assertion to assume all hungry and needy people are lazy. They are not! Among the five thousand hungry people (including children) whom Jesus fed, statistically speaking, a few of them might have been lazy persons; but Jesus fed them anyway, for no other reason than they were hungry. We Christians simply embody the words of our Savior, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." (Matthew 14:16).

My Christian friends, we are not suffering from some kind of political or partisan "derangement syndrome." In Jesus Christ, we are merely speaking the truth. And speak we must!

Teaching With Soul—By Joel

When I was young, I was not the best at sitting still or being quiet or paying attention. If I'm being completely honest about it, I'm still not too great at these things today, but when I was under ten years old, I was utterly hopeless at them. Unfortunately being still, quiet and attentive are all skills that are needed in order to make it through your typical Presbyterian worship service. I have several vivid memories of just how tough it can be for an elementary student to behave for the duration of a whole church service. I can remember doing everything from reading to coloring to tic tac toe to help pass the time and keep myself occupied. It didn't always work and there were frequently times when I would try to amuse myself in other less appropriate more disruptive ways. I can remember my father, a Presbyterian minister, pausing in the midst of his sermon to stare at me, hold up his index finger and mouth the word "one" as a warning that I was getting too rowdy. If I didn't heed the warning, I'd get two fingers and a sternly mouthed "two" next. If I continued to misbehave, there wouldn't be a three so much as the service would just kind of stop while Dad came down from the pulpit to pull me out of the sanctuary by my ears. This meant that most Sunday's I was faced with the underwhelming choice between being bored or being in trouble. It didn't really make church my favorite place to be.

As I'm a parent myself now, I understand what a powder keg Sunday services can be to families with young children. Parents are on edge, because there is a perceived pressure for them to keep their children well behaved and perfect (Pro tip: no one really expects your children to behave perfectly in church). Children are on edge because they are not designed to be still, quiet and attentive and because they can pick up on the tense vibes given off by their parents. It's a wonder anyone wants to come to church in a situation like that. This is partially why we have the Children's church program that we do. I believe that it's good for children to learn the fundamentals of worship in an environment that is a little more geared towards their particular needs. It's a place where they can ask questions if they need to and explore the worship space in their own ways. That's what children's church is for, and it does a good job of that.

That being said, I believe it's important for children to have experience with the adult worship service too. This is why we keep the children in the service with us on communion Sundays. As bored as I was with church when I was younger, there were still times when I would look around and sense that something was happening and know that something important was going on. I could see that people were being moved by the music, touched by the scripture and challenged by the sermon. I could see adults that I knew and who I loved engaged in worship. Experiencing that kind of stuff is really no small thing for a kid. I was too young to know it when it was going on, but there were times when I would put down my coloring book and really feel the Holy Spirit at work in the church services that were often so boring to me. I think that's important for kids too.

I was reading a Blog post recently by Carolyn Brown, a pastor and Christian educator who was discussing the difficulties that often present themselves whenever children and adults worship together. Brown suggests that the first step towards cohesive multigenerational worship is a fundamental shift in the understanding of what worship is. She suggests that we should see worship as being more like a sport and less like a movie. Meaning that worship is something we actively do and not something we passively watch. When we accept this understanding, we realize that children need practice at worship to get better at it just as much as they might need to practice a sport to improve. By that analogy children's worship is like tee ball. It's a good way to learn the fundamentals to a point but some things you can only ever learn by getting out there and taking a few swings at actual pitches. Even if you miss more than you hit, the experience is still valuable.




