#### News Brief from Session

#### **Teaching With Soul By Joel**

For this next installment of our series of articles delving into the 10 commandments, we will look at the fourth commandment using the command divisions of the reformed tradition. We will continue the practice of looking at each commandment from both a negative/prohibitive and positive/encouraging viewpoint. We will accomplish this by spending some time reflecting on what the commandment specifically forbids, as well as some time reflecting on what the commandment gives back to us in return.

The fourth commandment (remember the Sabbath and keep it holy) is the last of the commandments that focus directly on our relationship and interactions with God, Almighty. The final six commandments that follow commandment four focus more on how we interact with each other than on how we interact with God (ie: don't lie to each other, don't murder each other, don't envy each other, etc.). The first four commandments give us a kind of outline of what a good relationship with God looks like. Thy define a proper relationship with God as being faithful and prioritized as is prescribed by the first commandment, direct and boundless as is prescribed by the second commandment and familiar yet submissive as is prescribed by the third commandment (see my previous four articles for more information on these commandments and their meanings). Finally the fourth commandment tells us that a good and proper relationship with God is one that is developed through time spent together, specifically one day out of every week, a day we've come to refer to as the Sabbath.

The relationship between humanity and God, like any relationship, needs time to blossom and time to mature. The fourth commandment is a prescription to ensure that time like this is set aside on a regular basis. Unlike the other commandments we've looked at so far, the give and take of the fourth commandment is pretty much spelled out for us in the text itself. The command takes away a day spent working in toil and in return gives back to us a day spent with God at rest. It takes away our worldly pursuits for a while and in turn gives us permission to relax and do nothing in the name of God and, as the great philosopher Winnie the Pooh once put it, "doing nothing often leads to the very best kind of something". In this case, that very best kind of something is time spent in intimate communion with God, Himself.

Truthfully, calling it "doing nothing" might be a bit of an oversimplification, because it is more than just that. The Sabbath is not just nothing for nothing's sake. It is a deliberate sort of nothing with the intention that the void created be filled with the something of God. God can fill this void by way of a worship service or perhaps a walk in the woods or perhaps some time spent in silent prayer or the enjoyment of family or even, in the best of cases, a much needed nap because the good news of the fourth commandment is that in the Christian faith, rest is sacrosanct. If you're anything like me It's high time we started living our lives that way.
