MEDITATIONS ON THE APOSTLES' CREED

"I BELIEVE IN GOD THE FATHER"—the very first ascription that the Apostles' Creed attributes to the God in whom we Christians claim to believe. But, what do we mean by calling God "Father?"

The terms "Father," "Son," and "Holy Spirit," are all too often downplayed as mere names-simple identifiers for the three persons of the Trinity. But they are so much more than mere placeholders for the three personae of the triune Godhead. Indeed, the term "Father" is a biblical name that represents God's dynamic role as the prime mover of creation, the pilot of cosmic destiny, and the author of salvation history.

The Apostles' Creed affirms our belief in God as the Father of Jesus Christ. But, more so, it affirms our belief in God as our heavenly Father also. Indeed, Jesus himself invites us to become God's children and to share in this intimate relationship-to know and enjoy God as our Father. As Jesus addressed his followers in his sermon on the mount, he instructed them how to pray to God by saying, "Our Father in heaven, may your name be revered as holy" (Matthew 6:9). In his post-resurrection appearance to Mary Magdalene, Jesus charged her, "Go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God" (John 20:17). Even the apostle Paul recognizes our kinship to God in the salutations of most of his letters, e.g., "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 1:7).

Our claim that we are children of God is not an assertion that we too are begotten of the Father like Jesus Christ. Rather our claim to divine kinship is through adoption. This adoption is the work of Christ's Spirit, the Holy Spirit, becoming one with our spirit. As the apostle Paul explains:

"All who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, 'Abba! Father!' it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs: heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ." (Romans 8:14-17a)

But, what does it mean to say that, like Christ, we are children of God who cry, "Abba! Father?" Let us first respond to this question by acknowledging what it does not mean. Being children of God does not mean that we Christians have exclusive access to God. Many Christians have erred in believing that God does not hear the prayers of non-Christians, and they have based this erroneous belief on their misunderstanding of Jesus' statement, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6). Note that Jesus did not say, "No one comes to God except through me." Rather, he is affirming that he is the way to know and experience God as more than some generic deity. Jesus, the Son, is declaring that we, as God's children, can know God as a loving Father—as a Father who loves his Son-as a Father who loves his children. "See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God, and that is what we are" (1 John 3:1a).

To be called children of God, then, is to affirm that God loves us as dearly as a parent loves the children. Jesus chooses to illustrate the Father's great love for his children in the parable of the prodigal son. Accordingly, a son goes to his father and demands his share of the estate—a share that would not otherwise become his until his father's death. This demand was tantamount to a declaration of severing the familial bonds between himself and his father. Inexplicably, the father acquiesced, and gave his son all that he would elsewise inherit.

In a distant country, the son prodigally squandered his wealth until all of his inheritance was spent. Now poor and destitute, he resolved to return home, to denounce his right to sonship, and to plead for a servant's role in his father's household. Then, according to the parable, "he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him" (Luke 15:20).

The magnanimity of the father's love is evidenced in his running to embrace this prodigal son while he was still far away. In ancient middle-eastern societies, it was regarded as unseemly for an adult man to run. So, the fact that the father endured the personal indignity of running displays the very depth of his compassion for a son who was lost to the family and was as good as dead.

Perhaps no other parable in the New Testament describes the loving and caring nature of God as well as this story of a father waiting for the return of a wayward son. This parable is arguably his best illustration of what Jesus meant when he addressed God as *our* Father.

And yet, for many modern-day Christians, the term "Father" might be problematic; their image of fatherhood has sometimes been tainted by an experience of a less-than-loving father. For such persons, the term "Father" conjures up images, not of sacrificial compassion, but of apathy or perhaps even abuse. Some Christians have preferred a feminine image of God, having received more nurture and compassion from their mothers than their fathers. Indeed, the Bible is replete with many maternal allusions to God's love; e.g., "As a mother comforts her child, so I will comfort you; you shall be comforted in Jerusalem" (Isaiah 66:13); or, "Can a woman forget her nursing child, or show no compassion for the child of her womb? Even these may forget, yet I will not forget you" (Isaiah 49:15). Of course, for those whose image of motherhood has been blemished by an experience of an uncaring mother, these biblical allusions to God as "Mother" are just as disconcerting as the term "Father" might be for others.

To be sure, we certainly stand on firm biblical and theological foundations to speak of God in our spiritual devotions and pravers as a loving father, as a nurturing mother, even as a compassionate parent. So, why does the Apostles' Creed address God as Father rather than Mother or Heavenly Parent?

While both masculine and feminine images are aptly utilized in scripture to describe God's loving nature and compassionate activities, the term "Mother" is inexplicably never used to address God by name. For this reason, the authors of the creed opted to call God "Father" by name—a hallowed name that Jesus Christ employs to proclaim God's unconditional parental love. So, whenever we meditate upon the words of the Apostles' Creed, may we hear the name as a bold declaration that we are the children of a compassionate, sacrificial God.

GREETINGS FROM THE MISSIONS COMMITTEE!

We thought you would like to know that we received a call recently from the Presbytery of Transylvania to inform us that our congregation gave the most money of any church in the Presbytery to the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering we collected on April 2^{nd} . The amount we collected was just a few dollars short of \$3000.00. This is noteworthy because our congregation is not the largest nor even the second or third largest in the Presbytery. We continue to be very mindful of the many needs of others in our local community and in our world.

On August 13th we collected our third 5 Cents a Meal Offering of the year totaling \$850.00. We will send 80% of that total to the Presbyterian Hunger Program and 20% will stay in Richmond and be given to support the work of Grace Now.

The next special offering of this year will be on September 10th and 100% of that offering will go to support the Buckhorn Children's Home, an agency near and dear to the hearts of the congregation of First Presbyterian Church.

Three more special offerings remain to finish up the year after the Buckhorn Offering is received on September 10th. They are the Peace and Global Witness Offering given on October 1st which is World Communion Sunday. On November 12th we will collect the 4th Quarter 5 Cents a Meal Offering. The last special offering of the year is the Christmas Joy Offering which is collected on the Sunday before Christmas which is December 24th this year.

We will provide you with more specific information about these special offerings as the collection dates get closer. The Missions Committee commends the faithfulness of our congregation as we support our brothers and sisters around the world who are suffering from hunger, natural disasters, and many other pains and tragedies.
