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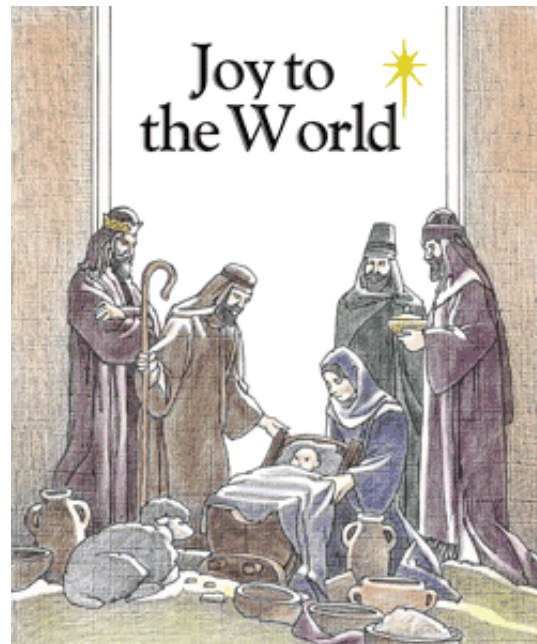

## ***PRESBYTERIAN TIDINGS***

### **HUMAN RIGHTS ARE DIVINE RIGHTS**



For the past year or two, the dominant slogan, the prevailing mantra of the American ethos has been the phrase, “America First.” And this certainly seems like an intuitive rallying cry that all proud and patriotic Americans can get behind. It implies that the definitive values that characterize us as citizens of the United States will be the primary values that determine our ethical and political actions in the world. It implies that all other system of values will be subordinated to those that make us Americans. “America First” implies that even the values of the kingdom of God will yield to the American way of life. Now, even if American Christians were willing to concede their Christ-like values to the pseudo-supremacy of this “America First” ideology, I submit to you that not even proud, patriotic Americans are living up to the national values that they so dearly affirm to defend.

Those who claim to be placing “America First” ahead of all other nations’ interests are proposing that the general welfare of US citizens must take precedence over the needs of others. From this ideology, our nation’s administration now justifies using lethal military strikes on civilians at sea in international water. The justification given for these military strikes is that the people targeted are maritime drug-runners bringing cocaine and fentanyl in our country.

The problems with this justification are manifold. First, drug-running is not an act of war but is a felony and therefore does not warrant military action. Second, the administration has options other than lethal military strikes; options such as maritime interception by the US Coast Guard, which is part of the USCG mission. (Indeed, if we can track these drug-runners well enough for precision military strikes, we can certainly intercept them with CG ships.) Third, if they are merely drug-runners and not an invading military force, then the death penalty for drug-running is a punishment disproportionate to the crime (i.e., the Eighth Amendment of the US Constitution). Fourth, the administration claims that these maritime suspects are drug-runners without presenting any evidence of the alleged felony, thus denying them due process (a Fifth Amendment right afforded even non-citizens).

The international community, through the United Nations, has sharply criticized recent US military strikes on alleged maritime drug-runners, stating the actions violate international law and human rights law. The UN has thus demanded an immediate halt to these military strikes. Unfortunately, many who promote the so-called “America First” ideology do not heed the criticisms of other peoples and nations simply because they are not Americans. For them, “America First” does not mean “liberty and justice for all,” but “liberty and justice for only those whom we deem Americans.”

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As a Christian, who happens to be a US citizen, I have always believed that the US Constitution, even with its imperfections, is the core of what I assume are American values. I believe that the rights canonized in the Constitution are not just rights for Americans, they are rights that I would wish for all people. And, why wouldn't I want these rights to be universal? If I cherish these rights for myself, wouldn't I want them for everyone else? As a proud and patriotic American, I believe that American rights should be inalienable human rights. The compassion and justice that I would hope for others has nothing to do with their nationality, but everything to do with mine.

As a Christian, apart from my nationality, my ethnicity, my race, my gender, and my orientation; I believe in one God. And, believing in one God, I also believe in one humanity. I believe in Jesus Christ and his unconditional love for all, and as such, I believe that we are all beloved sisters and brothers (without regard to each one's faith). The compassion and justice that I would hope for others has nothing to do with their faith, but everything to do with mine.

My Christian friends, my fellow Americans, my brothers and sisters of the world; we do not have to break the laws in order to welcome the stranger, to minister to the sojourner, and to promote compassion and justice for everyone. If there is indeed one God, then there is only one humanity. Thus, American rights are human rights; and human rights are divine rights.

We will also need volunteer drivers, kitchen help, servers, reception help, plus other helpers.

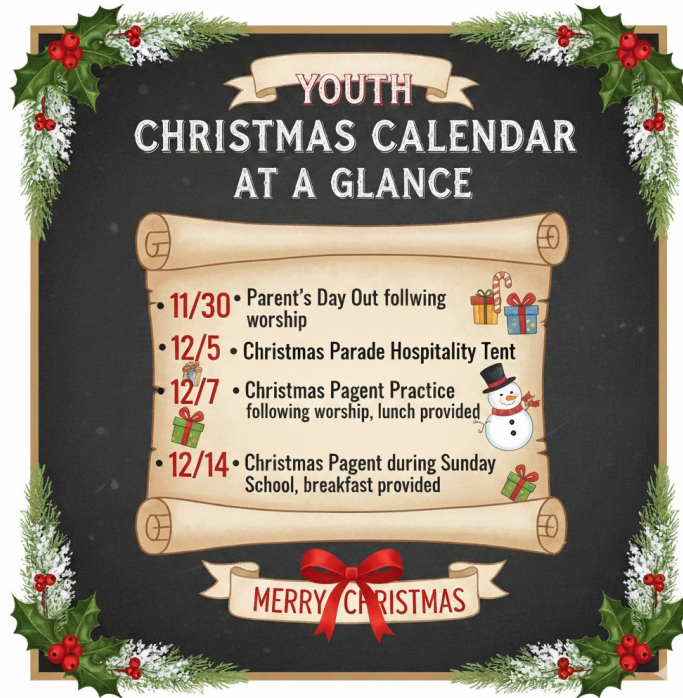

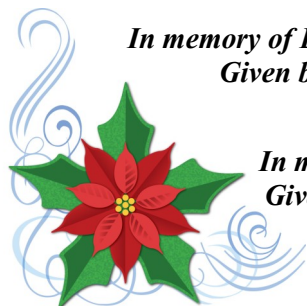

I love Christmas specials. I have loved them since I was a little kid and as I've gotten older, I've noticed that the Christmas specials I loved as a child have really only improved with age. Their messages and themes have stood up to the test of time and, more often than not, fall into line with our own Christian beliefs. So I thought I might take some time in this month's article to point out some of the Christian theology that can be found in the shared cultural heritage that is Christmas television programming. I am doing this because watching Christmas specials together as a family creates some fantastic teachable moments and my hope is that this article might lead to some meaningful discussion between parents and children should they find themselves enjoying one of these classics together.

### **How the Grinch Stole Christmas**

At its heart, this is a tale that speaks against the materialism that comes with Christmas. Its message is that Christmas is more than just gifts and stuff. Christmas has a deeper meaning that can't be bought in a store. The special doesn't come right out and say it, but this deeper meaning to the season can easily be interpreted to be Christ's love. That is why the Grinch failed at stealing Christmas. No one can steal Christ's love away from you. This is an important message for children at this time of year when the prospect of getting good gifts might lead to attitudes of greed and feelings of entitlement. Some good questions to ask might be: Why do you think the Whos sang when they woke up and saw that all of their stuff had been stolen? How do you think you might react if you woke up on Christmas morning and there were no presents? Why would you react that way? Do you think there might be people in the world who don't get presents at Christmas? What might we, as a family, be able to do to help those people? Some good scriptures to read might be: Matt. 6:19-21, 1 John 3:17, 1 Timothy 6:6-10.

### **A Christmas Carol**

This story has been told and retold an almost countless number of times and in a countless number of ways. Mickey Mouse, the Muppets, Mr. Magoo and the Looney Toons all have their own version of this Dickens classic and the chances are good that you will watch some version of this tale together as a family before Christmas is over. The Christian theme in this story is the theme of redemption. Ebenezer Scrooge starts off as a cheapskate skinflint who is meaner than a hornet but by the story's end he has changed into a loving, gracious man. This speaks to the truth that none of us are beyond redemption and that there is nothing we can do in life which can't be forgiven. Some good questions to ask might be: Have you ever known someone who has changed into a better person like Scrooge? Who and how? In the show, three ghosts work to change Scrooge's heart. Who is it that works to change our hearts? What are some ways that Christ has helped you to be a better person? Do you think it is possible to do something unforgivable? Do you think you would be able to forgive Scrooge for acting the way he had? Some good scripture to read might be: Romans 8:38-39, Matthew 18:21-22, 1 John 1:8.

### **Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer**

The Christian theme in this program is the theme of acceptance and diversity of gifts. Rudolph is originally cast off because he is different from the other reindeer, but in the end it is this difference which comes to save the day. Some good questions to ask might be: Have you ever been kept out of a group? When? How did it feel? Do you think it is good or bad to be different? Why? What are some ways we can reach out to people we might consider to be different from ourselves? Rudolph's nose turned out to be a real gift from God, what are some gifts that God has given you? Some good scripture to read might be: 1 Corinthians 12:12-30, Romans 15:7, 1 Corinthians 1:10, Galatians 3:28.

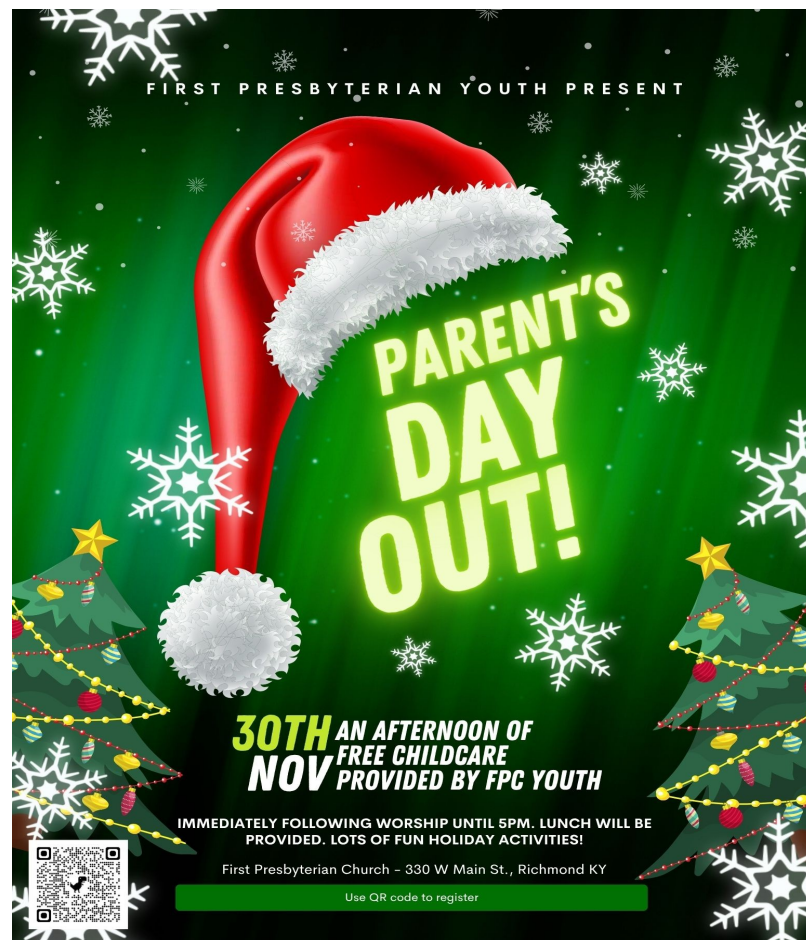
# FELLOWSHIP HIKE—December 5, 2025
