THE ESSENTIAL QUESTION

"If you were to die today, do you know whether you would go to heaven?" I have been asked this question many times by many well-meaning Christians. It is perhaps another way to ask whether I am saved. But this doesn't seem to be the right question that we Christians should be asking of ourselves. Sure, it's a question that is born of a hypothetical curiosity that naturally stems from our faith in God. But, in the end, it's really only an auxiliary question.

When asked, "If you were to die today, do you know whether you would go to heaven," I often answer that I don't "know," and I don't need to "know." But I trust that God will do for me what is loving, forgiving, compassionate, merciful, and righteous. My faith in Jesus Christ impels me to trust that, by the grace of God, heaven will take care of itself. I need not fret my sin, my mortality, my estrangement from others, my alienation from God, or my eternal destination. My faith in Christ frees me from anything that might otherwise separate me from the love of God, and it thus frees me to serve the kingdom of God with confidence and joy. For me and my faith, salvation is more than going to heaven.

My eternal destiny is not the essential question of my faith. No, the questions that define my Christian faith are, "How do I enact the Kingdom of God in my life?" "How do I do justice and love kindness?" "How do I walk hum-

bly with God?" "How do I love my neighbor?" "How do I love my enemies?" "How do I feed the hungry, welcome the stranger, tend to the captives and the sick?" "How do I take up the cross as Christ commands?" My faith in Christ is not about where I will go when I die, but how I make Christ's love known before my life on this side of heaven is concluded.

Teaching With Soul Joel

I've been involved with church youth groups in some capacity or another for over three decades now. That's been a lot of camps, retreats, lock-ins and mission trips and one thing that all of these events have had in common is the use of covenants. Every church small group I've been a part of has started out with some kind of covenant building or another. Just this summer, Triennium had a covenant, Montreat had a covenant, Burnamwood had a covenant and now, thanks to the hard work of our session, our church has its own covenant too. I'm attaching a copy of our covenant to this newsletter so that you can check it out first hand.

The concept of covenant building is a biblical one. God makes covenants with His people throughout the recorded history in scripture. These covenants are, essentially, promises God makes to us. They are promises that we can trust God to keep no matter what. Covenants are not the same as contracts that, when broken by either party, become null and void. Covenants are stronger than that. The commitment God has for us and that we have for God can withstand failure. We can fail to uphold our end of things (and often do) and God will still be true to the promises he has made to us and those promises are plenty.

The first of God's covenants comes to us in the Noah story when God sets a rainbow in the sky and promises never to destroy the world with water again. God also covenants with Abraham to give him many descendants and Jesus Christ, himself, is known as God's new covenant. This is because God makes a promise through Christ of a new way to handle the stain of sin upon creation. There is nothing we can do to cause God to break these promises, though the covenant does come with expectations. The covenant is not broken by our failure to adhere to those expectations. If that were the case, I'm positive there would have been a second flood by now.

At youth events, when we build a covenant to guide our time together, we are creating a set of mutual agreements that help us respect each other and honor the sacred space we share. These covenants are an outline of how we can best live out our faith in the time we have together. Our church covenant is no less than that. It's an agreement on how we will live, worship, and serve together as a community and like the covenants God makes with us, this promise is stronger than our failures. When we look at our covenant, we are reminded of the high standard we are called to, and also of the grace we are called to offer one another when we fall short.

Ultimately, our commitment to this church covenant is an act of gratitude for the unbreakable covenant God has already made with us through Christ. It's a way of saying: because God has promised us unfailing love and faithfulness, we will do our best to extend that same love and faithfulness to our neighbor...here's how...


